2023 Student Attitudes to School Survey (AtoSS)

We value student voice as a means to improving student engagement, wellbeing and quality instruction and are conducting a survey to find out what your child thinks of our school.

The AtoSS is an annual student survey offered by the Department of Education and Training to assist us to gain an understanding of students' perceptions and experience of school. Students will be asked about their thoughts and feelings in relation to our school, their learning, peer and family relationships, resilience, bullying, mental health and wellbeing, physical activity, and life in general.

This year, the AtoSS will be conducted at school over the period of 30th May to 10th June. If you do not wish your child to complete the survey, please email the school asking for your child to opt out.

Mental Health and Wellbeing Services

Child Safety

HDSC has previously informed staff, students, and parent/ caregivers regarding new Child Safe Standards noting the changes and continue to work hard to ensure student safety. Since last year, we have updated school policies to ensure we are up to date with the required changes to the Child Safety Standards. We have all completed training, conducted cybersafety, provided a strong wellbeing team, and increased student voice. Our school policies are available on our website page or upon request from the school. Feedback is welcomed from our community.

We look forward to the Melinda Tankard Reist workshops in the next few weeks. Melinda Tankard Reist (www.melindatankardreist.com) is an author, speaker, media commentator, blogger and advocate for young people. She is best known for her work addressing sexualisation objectification, harms of pornography, sexual exploitation, trafficking and violence against women. Daniel Principe has joined Melinda, and is a dynamic, passionate and natural commentator. Together, Melinda and Daniel work with school students to assist them to understand the impacts of harmful messaging from media, advertising, pop culture, limited and harmful stereotypes about masculinity and the global porn industry. Nationally Consistent Collection of Data (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability. The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process.

The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified. The privacy and confidentiality of all students is assured. All information

is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. Further information about the NCCD can be found on the NCCD Portal. If you have any questions about the NCCD, please contact the school.

Uniform

It has been a good start to the term with correct school jackets and tops, but a quick reminder about our uniform is needed. Correct uniform item include: Polo shirt, school jacket, blue dress pants, shorts, school dress, skirt and dark closed in leather shoes, and HDSC beanies. Items can be purchased from the school office.

Gym clothes are not to be worn to school, nor home from school. When students have sport, they are to change before and after the lesson.
